From the Pastor's desk – April 2024



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

Alleluia! Christ is risen!

I raced home from wherever, whatever, to park myself firmly in front of the family television set. (Yes, my child, there was a time when houses had only one. And if you were engaged in watching with the family elders—that's the way we did it then—you, dear child, were the remote. "Adjust the antenna." "Turn it to Channel 2." "Turn it up." Kids, ask your grandparents what these vintage phrases mean.) So gripped was I by the trek of the Apollo astronauts, I raced so as not to miss a moment of those epic voyages.

If I could dig through the buried boxes of photographs of my childhood, I would find many images of me in my natural habitat—my bedroom walls festooned with what, at that moment, were the most important things of my young life. Like so many other American children of that era, I had cheap, crushed felt pennants of my favorite teams. White Sox and Blackhawks memorabilia. An autographed picture-postcard of Stan Mikita, slipped under the glass top of my little desk. And walls covered with pictures of men—human beings—standing on the surface of the moon.

Imagination sparked by those photographs and lo-fi grainy images broadcast from outer space, I set my course on becoming an astronaut (Latin for "star voyager"). Library visits and research conducted, I learned all the requirements, all the boxes to be checked on the path to star voyager. And here I am, living life as a Lutheran pastor in a small church in fly-over country. Living in a place people pass through—or over—on their way to where things really happen. The star voyager: a dream never realized. Then came the dream of becoming an airline pilot. Models of planes frozen in dogfights and rescue missions hung from my ceiling. And today I can say I've only been a passenger on commercial, or any other, flights. I think about that particular dream: flight at the control of my hands. I don't know that I'll ever learn to fly. It's expensive. It requires access to a machine capable of flight. And I'm getting old (and, of course, to anyone a decade or two younger than me, I am old).

There's the rub, right? My life, like yours, has been filled with many dreams and plans. And as an aside, I am thankful I grew up in a nation, community, and family where dreams, however large, seemed possible. Those dreams and plans... I had many. But family, work, putting food on the table, raising children, and the relentless ticking of the clock all took their toll. One day you rise, and things are different. Suddenly, time seems short. Those plans and hopes now seem out of reach. Time will not allow. And even if there is time, who can know? Even if there is time, there is the ugly truth of the curse. Age exacts an awful toll. The body can no longer do what the mind desires.

Yet, with the many, many unrealized dreams, there is joy. Joy is found in the simple, everyday fabric of life. Joy is found in the looking back. Joy is found in the learning that had some of the dreams (like rock star) been realized, the personal and spiritual toll may have been great—even deadly. Even today, I am filled with admiration for people labeled as successful by worldly standards who remain steadfast in their confession of Christ. I'm not sure I would have such strength. And had those dreams come to fruition, I would not have known the great blessings and joys of being a pastor. By God's grace, hopefully we all learn the blessing of vocation.

So yes, the clock ticks. And time seems so short. Yet, for us there is always a looking forward. As we resign ourselves to the relentless ticking of the clock, we still know that our story is eternal. It is eternal as it is bound to the Eternal One. It is bound, by virtue of our baptism, to our own empty grave.

It's interesting that I seem in less of a hurry today than I was when I was young and time was something that could be wasted without regret. You would think that I would be in a greater hurry knowing that time is short and getting shorter. I suspect the opposite is true for me for two reasons. One, I know the value of time to just sit and contemplate—time to meditate on our Lord and our life in Him. Of course, there is work to be done, mouths to feed, and bills to be paid. But to slow down and sit and think, pray, meditate—this turns out to be a benefit to my neighbor. This aids them as I take time to sit and think through complex issues. To spend time learning the nuances of issues helps me govern my speech. This helps me act in a spirit of charity and forgiveness as so many issues have no clear and perfect path. I am able to reflect on the fact that the world is fallen and our actions and solutions are soiled with sin. And until our Lord returns, there is no way for us to enact Eden on Earth. More importantly, I know that my story does not end with my last breath. That my grave is merely a resting place. That in the Lord, my story is also eternal. My days are not numbered.

That's the crux of what we celebrate this time of year. During Eastertide we are reminded of, yes, the resurrection of our Lord, but also that in Him we too will rise. Death has no dominion over us. And in that freedom, we live and love as people of great hope and joy. And we live as people who readily sacrifice ourselves in a myriad of ways for our neighbor. So what if they take our time? We have eternity. So what if they sap our resources? We know all we have is a gift to be used in service of our neighbor. By our Lord's death and resurrection, and through His bestowal of the gifts of forgiveness and life on us, we indeed have all the time in the world—all the time in eternity.

I close with the words of our Lord: "Fear not, I am the first and the last and the living one. I died, and behold I am alive forevermore, and I have the keys of Death and Hades" (Revelation 1:17-18).

Alleluia! Christ is risen!

He is risen, indeed! Alleluia!

A blessed Eastertide to you!

Whose Is It Anyway?

If you have every bought or sold a house, you are acquainted with the concept of a "title search." Before you can sell your house, and before anyone else will feel comfortable putting down the money to buy it, you have to prove that you really own it. So a title company looks through the public records to ensure that you bought it from the person who really owned it, who bought it from the person who really owned it before that, all the way back to the earliest records of your state, including when your state was only a territory or colony of England.

Peak into a preschool classroom during playtime and you'll see a simplified version of this. A child starts playing with a ball, but another child says, "That's mine: I had it first."

You can't understand the Seventh Commandment without understanding this concept of ownership or title. As the Small Catechism puts it:

You shall not steal. What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not take our neighbor's money or possessions, or get them in any dishonest way, but help him to improve and protect his possessions and income.

Your neighbor's possessions are his: you don't have a right to take them. And likewise, your possessions are yours. Ownership and property rights are foundational to any functioning society.

But there is something deeper to know about ownership, and that is the question of who has the title and ownership to you? Paul says, "Or do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, whom you have from God? You are not your own, for you were bought with a price" (1 Cor. 6:19–20).

If you yourself are owned by God, then of course everything that you own, you really only possess by God's leave: all of it, at bottom, belongs to Him since you belong to Him. For you were bought with the blood of Christ.

This notion is the foundation of all Christian stewardship. It all belongs to God. It should all be used for things that bring honor to His name, blessings to our neighbors and the extension of His kingdom.
