#### From the Pastor's Desk – December 2025

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

"In him was life, and the life was the light of men. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it" (John 1:4-5).

Many of you, by the time this drops, will already have your homes and yards adorned for Christmas. Me too. I love the preparation for Christmas and all that goes with it. I love the busyness, the parties (small "p" parties—not those ragers you have at work), the caroling, all the extra church services that invite us into the ancient mystery, and the decorations. Decorations are such an interesting thing. The choice of how we adorn our hearths is rather subjective, yet that subjectivity tells us something about the hand that hung those ornaments.

Over the years, I've encountered people whose homes and yards are perpetually adorned with a plastic wasteland of Walmart, made-in-China baubles. Valentine's Day and that chubby pagan cherub; the Christ-less Easter pastel pastiche of bunnies, baby-chicks, and eggs; the Fourth; and the increasingly grotesque displays at Halloween. And then we arrive at Christmas. We boomers set the standard for indulgence in Christmas kitsch—the self-centered use (or misuse) of our disposable income.<sup>1</sup>

With our money and time, we seem to gravitate toward warm childhood memories. Of course, there arises a question: are our memories warm because of our actual history, or are they warm because we have been conditioned to have a warm and emotional response to certain stimuli? I think the latter is a bit closer to the truth—memories being such selective and malleable things. For proof of my conclusion, I offer the following: notice what decorates the lawns of many of our neighbors. What you will observe on lawns (and for sale in the big-box stores) are characters from childhood. You will notice characters from *Rudolph*, *Santa Claus is Comin' to Town, Frosty the Snowman*, and the seemingly omnipresent Disney cavalcade of characters. Also, pay attention to those "Christmas-y" commercials. You may notice advertisers selling feelings, while the

product is secondary.<sup>3</sup> You will also observe what's missing from said lawns and commercials. What's missing is Christ. Kitsch trumps Christ.

Why does our culture spend so much on these plastic idols? I think people are searching. They are looking for a glimmer of light in the darkness. They are looking to shove the darkness of life out of their minds, and they think the answer is found in memories and feelings. As noted, I think our memories and feelings are quite easily manipulated. So, we are directed to commercialism and consumption as a source of light. But that light is fake, plastic, cold, and lifeless. And that light fades. Christmas passes; then what? Our culture has no lasting answer, so it places before us—sells to us—other attempts to dispel the darkness. Hence, the endless parade of holiday kitsch. Yet that light remains impotent to lighten our darkness; life and death always worm their way in. It's a well-documented fact that Americans suffer from a great deal of unhappiness and increasing post-Christmas depression. The light so many choose is powerless to cast out the darkness. How sad it is that during one of the holiest times of the year so many poor souls are filled with such sorrow.

It is—or should be—different for us. Our focus during this holy season is directed solely upon the Christ. We sing ancient hymns (and I mean ancient, with many written during the early days of the Christian Church.) We sing of and reflect on God's promises and His steadfast love. We hear of, sing of, and adorn our homes with the light of Christ. And lights, few or many, that we hang on our trees, large or small, will be temporary reminders of the true Light. January will come bringing its bitter cold and long nights. Lights and trees and decorations will be boxed and placed in closets and attics. Parties and the like will be over (although we will, unlike the culture, sing Christmas hymns well into January when we celebrate the end of Christmastide on the Epiphany). And we will face the long, quiet days of winter. Yet, unlike the world around us, we will still celebrate. Long after Christmas, we will still have the Light. And it is a Light that winter cannot extinguish. It is a Light the darkness of sin and the blackness of a buried coffin are powerless to dim.

We have a Light. We celebrate a Light that cannot be dimmed—cannot be overcome, as the Word of God teaches us. Christmas is a celebration that indeed God came to us and walked among us, lived and died for us. The manger is only the beginning of our story as Christians. And even as the Christmas season ends, our story in Christ does not. Christmas leads to the cross. The cross leads to life. Christ came to restore us to a life with Him that does not end. Among us, Christmas and Easter have no end. So, our celebration continues long after the trees have dropped their needles. Our celebration has no end. The Light has no end.

This season is a wonderful time to invite those around us to come and walk in that Light as we do. It is a time to show those who are living in the darkness and reaching for so many false lights just where the true, undimming Light is found, and to begin with us an unending celebration.

"And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we have seen his glory, glory as of the only Son from the Father, full of grace and truth" (John 1:14).

The Lord bless each of you with a wonderful Advent and very merry Christmas.

"We ask you, brothers, to respect those who labor among you and are over you in the Lord and admonish you, and to esteem them very highly in love because of their work. Be at peace among yourselves" (1 Thess. 5:12-13).

Have you finished your Christmas shopping yet? Do you have a person or two on your list that you just don't know what to give them? While I know you are running short of ideas...dad doesn't really want another tie, and your kid's teacher doesn't need another coffee mug. It can be nothing short of maddening to try to figure things out in the middle of this busy season!

As stewards of all of life and life's resources, we know that life is more than giving gifts. We stewards never want to take anything the Lord provides for granted. During this season of Advent and Christmas, it is a great idea to do whatever you can to be a faithful steward of your pastor. Even more so than the rest of the year, the demands on their time, their presence and their stewardship of the Gospel in the congregation become heightened.

The demands on pastors can wear them down and wear them out. How does the steward in the congregation serve as a faithful steward of the treasure that is their pastor? Here are a few ideas:

- Put them at the top of your prayer list. Pray that the Lord guards them against the weariness that makes them susceptible to the work of the devil.
- Make worship a priority St. Paul admonishes the Thessalonians and us to respect those who labor among us. There is no greater way to steward your pastor than to respect him enough to show up and receive what he has been sent to offer in the proclamation of the Gospel and administration of the Holy Sacraments.
- Be receptive to his work If your pastor is tasked with calling you to repentance or encouraging you to be in worship, know that he is only caring for your soul.
- Esteem him highly Take the time to thank him for his faithful service to Christ, the congregation and your family.
- Be at peace This is an easy time for even minor annoyances to get blown out of proportion and become full-blown conflict. This not only spoils the season of Advent and Christmas, but it also spoils our stewardship of the Gospel and those who serve us in that Gospel. Remember that Jesus came into the world to be the Prince of Peace. This is an act of grace and mercy. The steward seeks to reflect this toward their pastor and their brothers and sisters in Christ.

Stewardship at Christmas can be a challenge. Stewardship of your pastor during this time of the year is critical to our shared stewardship of the Gospel at a time of year when many are more open to hear and receive it.
