FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK - MAY 2022



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

We often think the curse began with God's pronouncements in Genesis. You may recall how they play out. First, God spoke to the Father of Lies: "...cursed are you above all livestock and above all beasts of the field..." Next, to the woman He said: "I will surely multiply your pain in childbearing; in pain you shall bring forth children. Your desire shall be contrary to your husband, but he shall rule over you." Of course, this curse is all too visible around us to this day. And finally, He turns to the man and says: "By the sweat of your face you shall eat bread, till you return to the ground, for out of it you were taken; for you are dust, and to dust you shall return."

Indeed, these curses drench our lives in so much strife and misery. But in a sense, they are derivative. They are the product—the outgrowth—of the true curse. Their ultimate source was not God but that Ancient Serpent. God was not imposing these curses but pronouncing—explaining—the curse which Satan, with our cooperation, wrought. The root—the source—of our cursed lives is this phrase: "*Did God actually say…?*"² These words are the cause—the terrible river—from whence our sorrows flow. They are the curse.

Every good blessing with which the Lord has blessed us is now tainted by these words. "*Did God really say...?*" "He didn't mean that." "He wouldn't say that today." These, and many others, are phrases we too often use to bear witness that we are indeed captive to this terrible curse. These phrases, all branches of the dreadful question posed by the evil one, have resulted in the world we have made for ourselves with its myriad of sorrows. And sadly, this has become our starting point as we face the Word of God. It is our default way of thinking. We accuse the Truth of lying to us, and we use our own lies to establish whatever we think the truth should be. And the result? A disaster. Like our forebears, who in fear covered themselves with fig leaves, we shroud ourselves in a thin veil of lies. We dress ourselves in the clothing the Father of Lies happily provides for us.

Let me provide an example. You formulate an opinion about what the faith is and what the church should be—you decide what your truth should be. For example, you believe any type of relationship, any combination of people is good as long as it makes them happy. And this you call love—godly love, and you believe the church should be loving and bless everyone and every behavior. This opinion is formed from fragments of the truth—snippets of Scripture cut from their context and given a meaning the words don't actually convey. Your opinion is influenced and informed by the popular media that is constantly invading our ears. And, most insidiously, you base your idea of the truth not on the Word, grammar, reason, or history but on your feelings. What we feel trumps the Truth—in matters of faith and in other matters. Disagree? Then think about men participating on women's teams because they *feel* they're not men. Isn't the science settled on that? Hasn't science been settled for quite some time on the biological, physiological, and behavioral differences between those who carry the Y chromosome and those who do not? Feelings and opinions don't change the truth.

So, I, as a pastor, confront you on your thinking. I show you the texts, the contexts, the history of interpretation from the Apostles to this very day. I demonstrate that there is Truth that can be known and confessed and that your thinking is misguided and incorrect. Too often I'm told: "Yes, Pastor, I hear you, but I really feel..." Apparently, I am supposed to acknowledge that what you feel—what you believe as truth in your private interpretation—is, in fact, more valid than the actual Truth. Now, reading this, I hope you might recognize the folly of that. Indeed, you should. That type of thinking is an ancient heresy. It is the ugly child of that ancient curse. To call it by its name: Gnosticism.

Now, a simple definition of this heresy is this: Gnosticism is an esoteric belief or knowledge (that's what the Greek word *gnosis* means). The twenty-dollar word, which is key, is the word esoteric. Esoteric indicates that the knowledge is *private*. It's a privately held belief or an individually held interpretation of the truth. Granted, most of us don't live our daily lives with words like Gnosticism or esoteric rattling around in our brains. We, however, are more gnostic than we often realize.

There are many byproducts of Gnosticism in our daily lives. These affect how we interact with each other, how we use our voices in our communities, how we think of government, but most important to our present discussion, how we think and act spiritually—what we think and how we act about religion and God.³ Press someone who uses the old, tired line of "I'm spiritual but not religious." You will see his way of thinking and his actions are based on a privately held belief and not on the revealed Word, the history of that Word, and the application of that Word. That's Gnosticism. And many churches—denominations—in our time have, knowingly or unknowingly, embraced it.

The word denomination is a French word. It means something that is named. Each denomination is also body that has its own unique confession. Therefore, I prefer the word confession to denomination—it helps clarify that point. We are Lutheran. That is the name of our confession. Lutherans have a clearly defined and documented body of doctrine, or dogma. It is an anchored life we live as Lutherans. Our lives together are anchored in the unchanging Word of God—the Word of Christ. Our confession—our denomination—stands on the historic teaching of the Apostles and those who came after them and defended the Faith throughout the centuries. And when we stray, it is that doctrine, dogma, Word of God that calls us back. Therefore, our doctrine and our practice, which is inextricably linked to our doctrine, don't change quickly and don't change much at all. And so, we confess each Sunday our belief in the one holy Christian and *apostolic* Church. Our confession—our belief—is rooted in the words of Scripture, the grammar of those words, and the history of the life of Christ and His Church recorded in those

words. But in our day, there is a new kid on the block. Let me rephrase that. It's an old kid— ancient—that hopes to lead us astray by looking new. That new kid is the modern phenomenon of the non-denominational church.

Think about that name: non-denominational. By intention, these churches refuse to be named. One of the hallmarks of these churches is the downplaying of denominational differences. They often adopt catchy slogans that demonstrate that downplaying. They use slogans like "When you're ready for a relationship instead of religion." Now, there are some logical fallacies in that statement from which I will spare you. The point of concern here, remember, is this thing called Gnosticism, and this statement falls right into that "ism." Unpack the slogan, and you'll see it's communicating an importance (priority) of personal (esoteric) belief over doctrine. The Word, the grammar of that Word, the history of that Word, the defense of that Word throughout the Church's long story—you know, doctrine—are secondary. In these churches a person who believes in the real presence of Christ in the Holy Sacrament sits next to—communes with—those who confess it is merely symbolic. The same holds for those who confess the efficacy of Baptism and those who do not.⁴ Also, note that many of these churches are non-creedal. They reject corporate statements of belief, such as the Apostles' and Nicene Creeds, confessing that nothing like a manmade summary of Scripture should come between the individual and his or her interaction with Scripture. That, of course, is a bold gnostic statement. The personal belief trumps everything else.

I've had *far too many* conversations with this way of thinking lurking in the background. I know you have too. People leave our confession for any number of reasons, yet, when I ask them about the significant disparity in the understanding and practice of Baptism and the Lord's Supper, they typically respond along these lines: "I'm still Lutheran in my heart, and I still believe what you believe." So, do you recognize that? They cling to their personal (esoteric!) belief in the midst of another confession. And what, if we're naming things, do we call that? We call it Gnosticism. So, you see, we are far more gnostic than we recognize.

In the midst of all this, what are we to do?

In a word, repent. But how?

First, recognize that some of your personally held beliefs might just be wrong (gnostic). I haven't always been Lutheran. I changed confessions (denominations) because I was taught the Truth by faithful pastors. I was encouraged by those faithful people the Lord placed in my life to study and listen. Was it jarring? Of course! I left not just a church but a community. And it was (and still is) painful. But it was necessarily the right thing to do. And I am better for it. I had to realize that some of the things I was taught in my youth, or simply believed based on no other authority than my own arrogance, were wrong and were not in accord with the Word of God.

Second, trust that Word. Heed the Word of Christ. Hear Him when He says, "...observe [cling to, keep, hold fast] to all that I have commanded you" (Matthew 28:20). Truth is not defined by what you think or feel. Truth is the Truth. And it can be known. And most of us would agree with this until it lands in our lap—until we are forced to choose between what we think and feel and the Truth. That's where it gets tough. But still, your salvation is based on what the Lord declares, not on how you feel. Soon, in the Sundays after Easter, we will hear about the life of the ancient Church recorded in the Acts of the Apostles. Listen and reflect on those passages. You will hear and learn how our forebears trusted in the Word of Christ. Think of those baptized people in your life who can't make it to church and, as a result, don't feel so close to God. This is not because of laziness or

This indicates that perhaps they have a doctrinal stance too, however much they choose to downplay it.

misguided priorities, but because of life's circumstances, or age, or infirmity. Are they not saved? Of course they are. And you know this because the Lord *says* so.

Also, avail yourselves of opportunities to study good things, deep things, old things. As you study, you will see the striving for that oneness of confession throughout the ages. And you will see a vigorous defense of the same.

Finally, strive for that oneness of confession both publicly and privately. You'll find you're not alone. Submit to the living and active Word of Christ. And you will see through the thin veil of lies Satan constantly seeks to cast over your eyes. You will find peace—lasting peace. It is a peace which is born from and flows from our Lord. And regardless of what you feel, He will constantly remind you that you are His and you are saved.

I do not ask for these only, but also for those who will believe in me through their word, that they may all be one, just as you, Father, are in me, and I in you, that they also may be in us, so that the world may believe that you have sent me. The glory that you have given me I have given to them, that they may be one even as we are one, I in them and you in me, that they may become perfectly one, so that the world may know that you sent me and loved them even as you loved me. Father, I desire that they also, whom you have given me, may be with me where I am, to see my glory that you have given me because you loved me before the foundation of the world (John 17:20-24).

Living Sacrifices

Stewardship is not just about giving money to the church. It includes this, to be sure, but it is not limited to it. Stewardship involves our whole life – everything we have and everything we are.

Let us not, though, fall into the trap of thinking that because we give of ourselves in one area then we can neglect giving in another. Stewardship is not stealing from Peter to pay Paul. It is not a game that we play whereby we justify ourselves in not giving a tenth of our income because we have given in some other way.

This is why our Lord warns: "Woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! For you tithe mint and dill and cumin and have neglected the weightier matters of the law: justice and mercy and faithfulness. These you ought to have done, without neglecting the others." (Matthew 23:23) We are given to do both – tithe of ourselves and what we have.

And so it is that St. Paul makes his appeal to us: "I appeal to you therefore, brothers, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship. Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind, that by testing you may discern what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect." (Romans 12:1–2)

We are to present our bodies as a living sacrifice to God. We are not to have the mind of the world, where we exchange equal weight of this for an equal weight of that and think that we have done what God has required. Our whole life is given over for service in and for the Church of God. This is to be done in thanksgiving for what God in Christ has accomplished for us. This is our spiritual worship, the reasonable response to what He has done for us. Not one for the other but all in all.

But what does this look like? St. Paul never lays down a general principle without also giving us some practical application of what shape that principle is to take concretely. He gives the general principle that our bodies are to be living sacrifices to God. And, after admonishing those who have been given particular gifts of grace to serve the church, St. Paul then speaks generally of what is expected of all. He says:

"Let love be genuine. Abhor what is evil; hold fast to what is good. Love one another with brotherly affection. Outdo one another in showing honor. Do not be slothful in zeal, be fervent in spirit, serve the Lord. Rejoice in hope, be patient in tribulation, be constant in prayer. Contribute to the needs of the saints and seek to show hospitality." (Romans 12:9–13)

This is what it looks like to present your bodies as living sacrifices. This is how we live out the grace of God here in time.

Let us then heed the apostle's teaching. MAY 2022

After the resurrection of Jesus, not everyone believed the words of the women who went to the grave to continue the preparation of His body for burial. As they arrived at the tomb, the women were amazed to hear angels tell them: *"Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here; he has risen!* (Luke 24:5, 6)



They went to tell the disciples this amazing news," But they did not believe the women, because their words seemed to them like nonsense". (Luke 24:11). Later that same day, Jesus approached other disciples on the road to Emmaus, but they didn't recognize him. These disciples were sad as they discussed the events of the last few days. They did not understand. They had lost all hope. They thought that their Master was dead, and they didn't understand the stories the women were telling about Him having being raised to life again. He said to them, "How foolish you are, and how slow to believe all that the prophets have spoken! Did not the Messiah have to suffer these things and then enter his glory?" And beginning with Moses and all the Prophets, he

explained to them what was said in all the Scriptures concerning himself. As they approached the village to which they were going, Jesus continued on as if he were going farther. But they urged him strongly, "Stay with us, for it is nearly evening; the day is almost over." So he went in to stay with them. When he was at the table with them, he took bread, gave thanks, broke it and began to give it to them. Then their eyes were opened, and they recognized him, and he disappeared from their sight. They asked each other, "Were not our hearts burning within us while he talked with us on the road and opened the Scriptures to us?" (Luke 24:25-32)

• It is true that we cannot believe in Jesus by our own reason or strength. Belief comes only through the Holy Spirit who opens the eyes of our mind and heart so that we are able to see the truth which is revealed to us in the Holy Scriptures concerning Jesus. Then and only then are we able to become His followers.

• The President of the Synod of Mexico once visited the Monterrey congregation, where my father was pastor. He was invited to preach. His sermon was based on the resurrection of our Lord. He preached on the Biblical account of the two disciples on the road to Emmaus and how they invited Jesus to stay with them. He explained that when Jesus blessed the bread at the meal they enjoyed together, the eyes of the disciples were opened, and their unbelief vanished. Jesus had returned to revive their faith, restore their hope, and grant them the firm understanding that He had indeed risen from the dead. Pastor then taught us a short hymn where we also asked Jesus to "Stay with us". I can still remember the great joy and gratitude in my heart as I sang this hymn with other believers that day. It is true, my friends, Jesus is with us and all those who believe in his name! We have His promise in Matthew, "I am with YOU always, even to the end of the age". Thank you, dear Jesus!

In Mexico Mothers' Day is always celebrated on May 10th. It is the most beloved and important festival of the year for the family. It is a tradition that the children sing songs to their mothers on this day. We call it "serenata". A serenata consists of songs sung in the early morning with live music. Some hire a group of musicians with acoustic guitars. Others employ "The Mariachi", (a group of musicians who play traditional folk music with guitars, trumpets, and violins), or friends with acoustic guitars may form a group and travel to their mothers' houses and sing two or three songs. Upon finishing the songs, the mother must leave the house and thank the children personally with a hug and a kiss.





On this day,

the mothers also receive gifts: flowers, hugs, kisses and a lot of love from their children in appreciation. It is also a custom to observe festivals for the mothers in the elementary schools, where the students carry out dance numbers, interpret some songs and perform some

recitations like poems for mothers. Mothers are so pleased when they see their children doing things for them. In many schools the students do some handcrafts, like a decoration for the house, for their mothers. Children give it to their mothers on Mother's Day. CR will celebrate mothers on May 8th, 2022
