#### From the Pastor's desk - December 2023



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

To live as a Christian... It is quite a paradox. Christianity—being a Christian—is both easy and extremely difficult.

Now, most of you know I enjoy the great outdoors. Hiking, particularly backpacking, provides me an outlet and an enjoyable way to experience nature. Inevitably, when I share the tales of my "adventures," some well-meaning yet misguided soul will ask me if I found God. "No. I wasn't looking," is more-or-less my answer. Our Lord prohibits that. Of course, God's creation proclaims His glory. And I most certainly look to the beauty of God's creation and wonder about the God who makes such things—as long as the conditions are good. It's a completely different story if the weather turns ugly, animals loom, or I'm caught unprepared. Even then, the safety and shelter of a vehicle, paved roads, a hot meal, and soft sheets are rarely more than a day's hike away. You see, my "adventures" are rather controlled, bounded, and occur within the culture with which the Lord has blessed us.

Our beautiful national parks provide us with somewhat controlled and somewhat sanitized experiences of nature. These natural spaces have paved roads. They have campgrounds cleared and sometimes fenced. Trails and footbridges are maintained to provide easier access and guide our steps. Rangers, armed as they are, walk the trails to keep us safe from animals—and each other. Speaking of animals—and I've had my encounters—problematic (read "threatening") animals are relocated or destroyed. I carry lightweight shelter, tiny systems to safely purify water, nutritious and tasty dehydrated foods, small but powerful lamps to provide light in the dark, a tiny stove to boil water very quickly, and a few small but powerful items for self-defense.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> This theological concept is known as the "locatedness of God." The Lord does not want us roaming around looking for Him. He comes to us, gives His Word and Sacraments to us so we will know Him and the Christ who saves us. This doctrine is found throughout Scripture, especially in Exodus and Leviticus. It is most especially manifest in the Incarnation of our Lord, Jesus Christ.

All this serves to keep our "adventures" within reasonably safe boundaries. And even in very remote places outside those park boundaries—and I've ventured into a few—a small device in a pocket will call for help from the sleepless eye in orbit above. And help will come. All this is to say that we, even in those great natural spaces known as parks, are given a false impression of the fallenness of the world around us. What we experience is groomed, made accessible, palatable.

Now, as a brief aside, there is a gift in this. My experience in these parks reflects the biblical concept and family of words that describe a household and those who manage and dwell in said households. The English word we use to describe the management of a household (whether God's or our own) is a transliteration of the Greek word. The word we use is economy. St. Paul encourages and admonishes us to use our unique and God-given gifts to build up (in Greek, a form of the word economy) the household of God. Many people and their various talents are necessary for my park experiences to be enjoyable and safe. We use our talents to build each other up. The same happens in our homes with each member having various roles and talents shared to keep the household functioning. The same is true for our communities, and of course, the church. So that is the gift—using our various talents to build up the household of God. That's the upside. Now let's discuss the other side—the hard side of Christianity.

It is interesting—the increasing lack, at least in my lifetime, of a healthy respect for nature. I remember whitewater rafting not long ago on the Upper Gauley River in West Virginia. As we were being driven to the put-in point, our guide was rehearsing with us the various ways we were likely to meet our doom that day. As we arrived, we signed a nice, crisp sheet of paper relieving them of any liability should they be required to later fish one of our lifeless bodies from the rapids. Cue *Dueling Banjos*. One of the memories that's stuck with me was the guide's sharing of stories of the patrons who asked about the off button for the rapids, or where the wires were that guided the rafts through the ride! No such thing, of course, existed. But that's often what we expect. We expect someone to flip the switch when the ride gets too scary. No such switch exists.

I think we also often expect that from the Faith. When confessing becomes uncomfortable—or dangerous—we look for the off button. As our idea of civilization decays around us, it is indeed frightening. The hostility which simmered below the surface, out of sight, now appears on full display. Of course, our Lord warns us. He warns us as he says, "and you will be hated by all for my name's sake. But the one who endures to the end will be saved." Our Lord promises no easy ride in this life. We are sojourners. We live in a land that is not our home. And we are hated because our unfurled banner is the banner of the Cross—that ancient sign placed on our heads and hearts at the font. There, we each are marked as one redeemed by Christ the Crucified. There, we are claimed as His and we are reborn into His new creation. And yes, life lived as strangers in a strange land is hard.

Each day we are faced with decisions. We decide what to say and what not to say. We see others beaten down for proclaiming the same Truth we confess. We see, and we respond to the fear of what might happen. We respond with silence and inaction. We respond with weak "amens" to what the culture—not the Lord—demands we swear our allegiance to. And sadly, some walk away. They are the ones who perceive the cost as too high. In those moments of great and too frequent weakness, our Lord says to us:

So have no fear of them, for nothing is covered that will not be revealed, or hidden that will not be known. What I tell you in the dark, say in the light, and what you hear whispered, proclaim on the housetops. And do not fear those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul. Rather fear him who can destroy both soul and body in hell. Are not two sparrows sold for a penny? And not one of them will fall to the ground apart from your Father. But even the hairs of your head are all numbered. Fear not, therefore; you are of more value than many sparrows. So everyone who acknowledges me before men, I also will acknowledge before my Father who is in heaven, but whoever denies me before men, I also will deny before my Father who is in heaven.<sup>3</sup>

Our Lord knows how hard it is for us in this tired, fallen world. He knows our weaknesses. And yet, in His steadfast love, He forgives and rescues us. He reminds and admonishes us to stop being afraid. Regardless of what our eyes see, He IS victorious. And His victory, even over death itself, has been shared with us. Yet, it is hard for us, even as we know and confess the truth. It is hard to be moved out of our comfortable lives and into the wilderness, even as we stand saved by the blood of Christ.

This we do well to keep in mind as we turn to a new church year—as we begin the holy season of Advent. We are, as you may recall, ushered into this season of hope by being first reminded of the great times of tribulation that precede our Lord's second coming. This is where we find ourselves now. Our Lord spends a lot of time preparing us for this moment. It is good that we hear these things from Him. Our plight is not unknown to Him. He desires that we know what is to come. He desires that we know the tribulation that we must endure. And even then—even in that tribulation—He is victorious over the dark powers that harass us, His little flock. He knows there is no off button. And He reminds us that He has already pulled our dead bodies out of the water and given them, us, life. Life in Him. This, as Advent moves toward Christmas, is where we are directed. We are directed to the Christ that breaks into our world and saves us. In Him, we now live as people of light and life. And hope. And joy in the face of darkness.

And so we live. We live knowing we have been saved by the Christ. He has done it and bestowed salvation upon us. And we live slogging it out day after day in this hard life of sin, consequent misery, and death tugging at our elbows. Yet He is with us. He is with us, and He is reminding us of what we are but cannot yet see. He reminds us each Lord's Day what is ours and what we will one day soon see.

Stop being afraid. Stand in His promises in these dark and latter days. You are His.

I have said these things to you, that in me you may have peace. In the world you will have tribulation. But take heart; I have overcome the world." $^4$

#### The Measure of Our Generosity

If you open up the Small Catechism, you'll find a shortened version of the Third Commandment: "Remember the Sabbath day by keeping it holy." But if you look up the list of the Ten Commandments in Exodus, you'll find the full version:

Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy. Six days you shall labor, and do all your work, but the seventh day is a Sabbath to the LORD your God. On it you shall not do any work, you, or your son, or your daughter, your male servant, or your female servant, or your livestock, or the sojourner who is within your gates. For in six days the LORD made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that is in them, and rested on the seventh day. Therefore the LORD blessed the Sabbath day and made it holy. (Ex. 20:8–11)

Why did Luther shorten this commandment for the Small Catechism? Was it so that the kids wouldn't have so much to memorize? No, it was because Luther knew that all the details of the Third Commandment were part of the "shadow" of the Old Testament (Col. 2:16). Or as St. Paul puts it, there is "letter" in the Old Testament law and "spirit" (2 Cor. 3:6). The details of not working on Saturday were fulfilled by Christ. That part of the Sabbath regulation no longer applies. But the spirit of the law does remain: We need to dedicate sufficient time each week to hearing God's Word and giving it honor and respect. Or as Luther sums it up in the Small Catechism's explanation to the Third Commandment: "We should fear and love God so that we do not despise preaching and His Word but hold it sacred and gladly hear and learn it."

The same sort of analysis applies to our giving. In the Old Testament, God commanded the Israelites to give a tenth of their income to the Levites so that those men could dedicate their lives to serving in God's house, teaching the people, conducting worship, etc. In the New Testament, there is a rigid requirement listed about handing in your tax forms to church to make sure you've given enough. But the mandate to have a full-time ministry, which is the spirit of that law concerning tithing to the Levites, is right there in 1 Corinthians 9:14: "The Lord has ordained that those who preach the Gospel should make their living from the Gospel."

The New Testament church's job is significantly larger than the job of Old Testament Israel. We are commanded to preach the Gospel to all nations. There was only the temple to maintain in the Old Testament, but we have churches, schools, universities and seminaries, plus missionaries everywhere. So you tell me: Can we really undertake the work of the ministry if our giving doesn't even measure up to Old Testament levels of generosity?

#### LAS POSADAS: A Historical Advent-Christmas Celebration from Mexico

Las Posadas are the most popular festivals that are celebrated during Christmas in Mexico. Las Posadas are from December 16 to 24. They are a series of processions and parties. The Posadas re-enact Mary and Joseph's cold and difficult journey from Nazareth to Bethlehem in search of shelter. Las Posadas, a Spanish word means "inn", "lodging", or "accommodation". It is said in the plural because it is celebrated each day during this 9 day period.

The celebration has been a tradition in Mexico for 400 years. While its roots are in Catholicism, even Protestant Latinos follow the tradition. The tradition was begun by Spanish evangelists in order to teach the Christmas story to the indigenous and reportedly to substitute for rituals related to the birth of the pagan god Huitzilopochtli.

The celebration consists of a procession with candles, sometimes with individuals selected to play the parts of Mary and Joseph; sometimes with Mary riding a real donkey. If no one is dressed as Mary and Joseph, the procession generally carries a nativity scene.

The rest of the procession carries candles, paper lanterns and/or decorated staves. The procession will make its way to a particular home (a different one each night), where a special song is sung. In this song, those outside the house sing the part of Mary and Joseph asking for shelter while the family inside responds by singing the part of the innkeeper saying that there is no room. The song switches back and forth a few times until finally the innkeeper finally decides to let them in. The door is opened and everyone



goes inside where the guests are offered fried rosette cookies known as "buñuelos", steaming hot tamales and a hot drink called "ponche", which is made from seasonal fruits such as tejocote, guava, plum, mandarin orange, orange and/or prune, sweetened with piloncillo, a kind of brown sugar and spices with cinnamon or vanilla and other festive foods.



The kids get to break a piñata. Each is given a turn to try to hit "the piñata". Their eyes are covered with a bandana, given a stick and turned around several times. Those standing by try to tell the boy or girl where the piñata is. It is difficult to swing at the piñata since it is hanging from a rope and being pulled up and down by an adult. When the piñata is broken, candy and fruit fall out and everyone dashes to get some.

At the end of a posada, guests receive a small gift called an "Aguinaldo", usually a package with cookies, dried and fresh fruit and candy. Then carols called "villancicos" are sung. A very old tradition has these songs sung to the newborn Child Jesus at the Nativity scene.
