From the Pastor's desk - January 2024



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

We have just celebrated the Feast of the Nativity, and very soon will celebrate the great and ancient Feast of the Epiphany. In the Church's long history, the celebration of the Epiphany predates our celebration of Christmas—at least the way we celebrate it now. Epiphany, when we at the Astrowski homestead box up our Christmas tree and accompanying ornamentation for another year, was one of the great celebrations of the ancient church. It was so beloved as a feast as it meant those who for so long looked in from the outside were now welcomed inside. It was the feast that reminded the ancients that God's gift of love manifest in Christ was for everyone. It was (and still is) for you, me, and every single person you see each and every day.

Imagine what it was like to work so hard in a vain attempt to please a god that didn't even exist. Imagine, then, what it was like to be told that you cannot please God so as to earn your way into His good graces, but that He came to you and for you. Imagine! The burden's lifted. A God who comes to you—not when you've earned it and proved your worthiness (which is not possible), but a God who comes to you when you are His enemy. You, squarely encamped with deep roots on the enemy's home turf. You, living (so you thought) among the dead. To you, the Author of Life comes and pulls you out.

For while we were still weak, at the right time Christ died for the ungodly. For one will scarcely die for a righteous person—though perhaps for a good person one would dare even to die—but God shows his love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us. Since, therefore, we have now been justified by his blood, much more shall we be saved by him from the wrath of God. For if while we were enemies we were reconciled to God by the death of his Son, much more, now that we are reconciled, shall we be saved by his life. More than that, we also rejoice in God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have now received reconciliation (Romans 5:6-11).

These words of St. Paul remind us of that truth. That truly is the Christmas gift. Enemies are reconciled, and not just reconciled, but through the blood of Christ are welcomed in as fellow heirs to the kingdom of God. So yes, the Feast of the Epiphany was *very* important to the ancients. And it's important for us as well. This is why we keep it, always, at the end of the Twelve Days of Christmas—Christmastide. And why we keep our trees up and lit and continue to sing Christmas hymns throughout. We sing as others have put out their candy hearts and have fallen into the post-holiday doldrums.

I do find that interesting—the phenomenon known as post-holiday depression. (I use the word holiday here, as even though most houses are decorated with lights and trees and inflatables, many of the occupants probably have little more than a passing knowledge of what Christmas actually is.) This depression, I think, flows from a lack of understanding about Christmas and the God who is the author of the feast. There's little understanding of the Incarnation—that the Son of God walked among us. And there's little knowledge of the fact that He came not as a life coach or family therapist, but He came to save us from our sins—from ourselves. Those who fail to see this fall easy prey to the consumerist (gaudy, gross, cheap, fleeting as it is) culture. What they know, somehow, is there's a deep meaning to Christmas that eludes them. And as the holiday passes, they are left empty, devoid of the deep meaning.

We, however, are just beginning our celebration. Christmas, so close to the beginning of the new church year, directs us forward to the Passion and Resurrection of our Lord. We are reminded, in the weeks after Christmas, exactly why the birth of God in our flesh was necessary. And we see exactly how we, former outsiders, are loved by God.

So yes, we will joyfully keep the Epiphany, as a curious culture (and often our fellow Protestant Christian friends) looks on in puzzled wonder.

And as we gather that day, this is what we will hear:

The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who dwelt in a land of deep darkness, on them has light shone. You have multiplied the nation; you have increased its joy; they rejoice before you as with joy at the harvest, as they are glad when they divide the spoil. For the yoke of his burden, and the staff for his shoulder, the rod of his oppressor, you have broken as on the day of Midian. For every boot of the tramping warrior in battle tumult and every garment rolled in blood will be burned as fuel for the fire. For to us a child is born,

to us a son is given;

and the government shall be upon his shoulder,
and his name shall be called
Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God,
Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace.
Of the increase of his government and of peace
there will be no end,
on the throne of David and over his kingdom,
to establish it and to uphold it

from this time forth and forevermore.

The zeal of the LORD of hosts will do this (Isaiah 9:2-7).

Stewardship Newsletter Article – January 2024

The Chief Stewards of Humanity: Mom and Dad

St. Paul tells the Ephesians that the first commandment with a specific promise attached to it is, "Honor your father and mother so that it may go well with you, and you may live long in the land" (Eph. 6:2). This promise is one indication of the importance of this commandment. The other thing that highlights the special nature of this commandment is its placement within the Ten Commandments.

The Ten Commandments are clearly organized in two big categories. The first three commandments deal with our relationship with God. This category is called the First Table of the Law. The last seven commandments, the Second Table of the Law, tell us how we should relate to other people. These two tables correspond to what Jesus calls the two greatest commandments: "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind," and "You shall love your neighbor as yourself" (Matt. 22:37–39).

The order of the Second Table of the Law is also important. Murder is a greater sin than adultery, which is a greater sin that stealing, or lying, or coveting. But why is the Fourth Commandment first in the Second Table, ahead of "you shall not murder"? Is disobeying your parents really worse than murder? Or maybe we should give up on thinking these commandments are ordered?

The overall effect of this order is to get us to see our parents as a connection point between our neighbors and our God. Throughout our upbringing our father and mother stand between us and God and deliver His gifts to us: God clothes us, feeds us, protects us and teaches His Word to us through our parents.

So, parents have a very high calling from God. They are called to be stewards of the greatest gift: the gift of life.

Parenting thus gives us a keen insight into all our stewardship. Parents know that they have been given a great treasure in their children, a treasure that does not belong to them, yet for which they feel a great deal of responsibility. Truth be told, every gift we have been given is like this, because everything we have — whether our own personal skills and powers or our wealth and time — is all from God. He entrusts it all to us so that we can use it all and take care of it all for His great purposes.


