From the Pastor's desk – March 2024



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

Before we were ever called Christians, we were known as those who belonged to the Way.¹ This title links us directly to the words of Christ as He says *"I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me."*² There is only one Way. There is only one Name under heaven by which any of us can be saved. And that name is Jesus Christ. I also think of the Sermon on the Mount. In that sermon, spoken by the Son of God, we hear: *"Enter by the narrow gate. For the gate is wide and the way is easy that leads to destruction, and those who enter by it are many. For the gate is narrow and the way is hard that leads to life, and those who find it are few."*³ And of course, The Old Testament is rife with descriptions of us as sojourners, people—wherever we might find ourselves in this life—who are in a sense strangers journeying toward our true home, the life to come. So, it is good to think about ourselves, God's people, as those who belong to a way of life, a way of being, as those who live under the headship of Christ our Lord. He alone is the Way—the Author of our salvation.

So, what happens when we depart from the Way? How does that happen?

In his letter to the church in Galatia, St. Paul writes the following well-known verses: *"But even if we or an angel from heaven should preach to you a gospel contrary to the one we preached to you, let him be accursed. As we have said before, so now I say again: If anyone is preaching to you a gospel contrary to the one you received, let him be accursed."*⁴ The word used twice and translated as "accursed" is also rendered "anathema" (a transliteration of the Greek word), or as "devoted to destruction." That last rendering, I think, comes closest to the meaning of the word. Its roots are found deep in the Old Testament.⁵ A thing that is anathema, or devoted to destruction, is something used in the worship of pagan gods. By that thing's very nature, it is nothing other than a dead thing.

What, after all, is a pagan god? It is a thing with no life at all. A lifeless statue. Lifeless words. Lifeless rituals. To worship dead things is to walk in the way of death. The path is indeed a dead end. It is destruction.

The issue for St. Paul was not those who were coming into the church and saying all of it was just a bunch of hooey so, here, worship this alabaster toad. Not at all. The teaching that was infecting the church in Galatia was a *distortion* of the gospel. It wasn't Christ or this, but rather Christ *and* this. And the things that can be the "this" seem to be unlimited. And lest we forget, the devil hates the Gospel. He loves to add a little here, distort a little there. He desires to set our feet upon a slightly divergent path. That is all it takes. A slight step off the true path, and with the passage of time, we find (if we dare look) that the path we walk—the way—has led us into the wilderness, with the Way nowhere in sight. Think about the errors that have crept into the church—both ancient and modern. There's praying to the saints and the emptying of the blessed sacraments of meaning and power.

The Sacraments, for many, are confessed as things they do to demonstrate their obedience to God. They have, for a sad many, become symbols with no power to do what the Word says they actually do—what Scripture says they do. Baptism becomes merely a dedication that looks forward to a future faith. Holy Communion is for too many (the number should be zero!) merely bread and wine (or juice) and a simple remembrance. These are just a couple distortions of the Gospel that demonstrate a different way. These are not what that church has confessed from its earliest days (and what we still confess). And so far from the true Way have many strayed that many confess that the wayward path they trod is the only path. Proof? Just read this paragraph to someone who confesses these two erroneous things. You'll experience them digging in and becoming quite defensive. And these things, I beg you to note, found their beginnings within the church. Instead of "Christ alone," it is "Christ *and*" the church began to tolerate. I'll add that, so popular have these distortions become in our culture, the confessions that tolerate these things often appear highly successful from our point of view.⁶ That's another item to remember. Not only does the father of lies distort the Gospel but he often shrouds that distortion under the appearance of success. And, for us, that is often quite disheartening.

Success is a word I have come to loathe. Now, there is nothing wrong with being successful in the typical ways we Americans think about being successful. There's nothing wrong with wealth and enjoying the comforts with which we are blessed. What I'm thinking about here is the church. Rarely does a week pass when, in conversation with a well-meaning acquaintance, I am asked if "my" church is growing. Now, it most assuredly is my daily prayer that the church would grow. I'm sure that's your prayer too. We all live in the midst of unbelievers and people—often people we love—that have strayed from the faith. But what if the church doesn't grow? What if we increasingly see a church full of graying heads and few, if any, children? (That thought fills me with so much sadness.) Is a small or shrinking church a failure? Of course, these are the questions that arise when we convince ourselves the church is a business. Businesses, of course, are driven by the bottom line, and that bottom line is driven by the whims of the culture and the consumer.⁸ In order to remain successful, that is to keep the churches full and the cash flowing in, churches who adopt business and marketing practices must follow the culture. This explains why so many of the mega churches, in order to stay relevant to the consumer, change their doctrine. In the past few months, both Andy Stanley of Atlanta and Rick Warren of Southern California—two of the most "successful" and therefore influential pastors on the

⁶ There are several reasons for this, but the main reasons are a failure to submit to Scripture's teaching about the totality of our fall. Add to this a placing of reason above the Word of God. We use the gift of reason in submission to the Word of God. For instance, when the Word says the "Baptism...now saves you..." (1 Peter 3:21). To that, we simply say, "Amen."

American Evangelical scene—are changing their stance on long-standing (and Scriptural!) doctrines. Why? Scriptural doctrine is bad for business. It's really that simple. I pray that would never be us!

But what does the Word of God say about such things? Plenty! Our Lord says to those who remain good stewards of His gifts, “*Well done, good and faithful servant.*”⁹ Note that He does not say, “Well done, good and successful servant.” Add to that the frequent admonitions of St. Paul to the pastors Timothy and Titus to remain faithful to the Word they have been given. By contrast, in the vision John receives and records in Revelation, the Lord notes both the faithfulness and lack of faithfulness in the seven churches singled out in the first chapters of the vision. Of note here is what our Lord says to the church in Sardis: “*I know your works. You have the reputation of being alive, but you are dead. Wake up, and strengthen what remains and is about to die, for I have not found your works complete in the sight of my God. Remember, then, what you received and heard. Keep it, and repent.*”¹⁰ Yes, a church can look alive and actually be dead. Again, I pray that would never be us. It is a far better thing to be small than dead.

You see, this is the task, especially as we face the truth of the demographics of our community. We may be tempted (actually, we are tempted) to let our eyes and the church's bank account define our “success.” But if there is a measure of success, let it be this: that looking back, we can see that we have clung, tightly, to the Word of God. That we have repented when we discovered we had not. And that we always know that, no matter how large or small our church may be, Christ, in His entirety, is among us. I pray this would always be us! I pray our feet never depart from the Way.

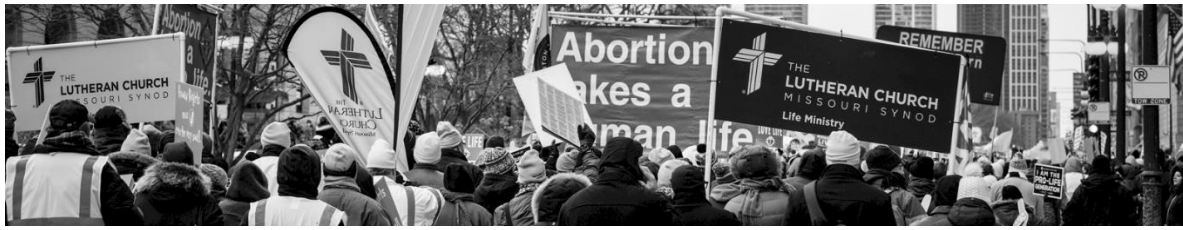
MOBILE KITCHEN

Cherish What God Has Given

In the Small Catechism, Luther follows a pattern when explaining the Ten Commandments. With each commandment, there is something prohibited, and something commanded. There is something wrong which must be avoided, and there is something right which must be done.

The one time this pattern is not followed is with the Sixth Commandment.

“You shall not commit adultery. What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we lead a sexually pure and decent life in what we say and do, and husband and wife love and honor each other” (SC I).

Here, the catechism focuses solely on the positive: we should live in a chaste and decent manner in both word and deed, and husbands and wives should cherish and honor one another.

Keeping this commandment, and all of the commandments, is a lot easier if you see your chastity and your spouse as a gift from God that is to be protected and cherished. In the same way, you will find keeping the Fourth Commandment easier if you see your parents and other authorities as a gift from God, given to you for your blessing.

This is the key stewardship insight that runs through all of the Christian life: Everything that we have has been given to us by God. We deserve none of it. All of it comes to us by God’s fatherly kindness and open-handed generosity. If I know that everything I have — every possession, every relationship, every ability — is a gift from God, then my perspective changes. All of these things are both gifts to be cherished, and things that I should direct towards God’s purposes. My possessions should be shared generously according to how God has called me in my family, church and community. My spouse should be cherished, loved and encouraged in faith. My children are on loan from my own Heavenly Father, and I have but a brief time to show them the path of righteousness. My neighbor is a gift from God so that I can imitate His kindness toward me.

No matter the gift, everything has been given to me by God so that I may participate in His own goodness and open-handed generosity.

Lent.



Lent begins on Ash Wednesday. On this day, as forgiven sinners, we receive ashes in the sign of a cross on our foreheads as the pastor says: *"for dust you are and to dust you will return."* (Genesis 3:19)

Do you ponder Jesus' sacrifice and death during Lent? Jesus knew His mission to save the human race from their sins was drawing closer and closer. He can see the punishment, suffering, and death He will experience. It was not easy for Him, but He willingly obeyed His Heavenly Father. He spent time in meditation and prayer as He prepared for this imminent event.

Usually when we talk about death, people, even Christians, become frightened. It's not easy when your doctor tells you bad news like "you have: diabetes, cancer, heart disease, etc." It's not easy to assimilate. How long will I live? Will I suffer a lot? These are just a few questions that come into our minds. It is not easy for us to deal with the fact that someday we will leave this world. It takes time for reflection.

To us, as Christians, Lent is a time of spiritual preparation and prayer. In this season, we need to look, in a serious and respectful way, at the act of Christ's sacrifice for us on the cross. We need to realize that it is our sins that nailed Him to the cross. It is a penitential season of the church year. He hangs there suffering on our behalf. And He does it all out of love for us miserable sinners. And we also ask God to help us accept our own inevitable death trusting that He will deliver our souls into His presence where we will await with hope our resurrection on the Last Day.

Realizing all that Jesus has done for us we can sing or say the words of this beautiful Lenten hymn:

Christ the life of all the living,
Christ the death of death our foe,
Christ Yourself for me once giving
To the darkest depths of woe
Through Your suffering, death and merit
Life eternal I inherit.

Dearest Jesus unto You. Amen and Amen!
