From the Pastor's Desk – July 2025



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

How are we to reconcile God's mercy and His wrath? That is the question I will explore in the next several paragraphs.

As I write this, our nation again remembers D-Day—June 6.¹ I think a lot about that day and the fortunes of war. I think about how, on a June day in 1944, while their families and friends, at home in sleepy towns, tended tender spring gardens, baked, mowed, and read the paper with news from far-away fronts, thousands of men jumped into the water and began advancing on a beachhead. As the folks at home, not knowing what was transpiring half a world away, readied themselves to retire for the night, their fathers, sons, and brothers disembarked their landing crafts and stepped into what historians would call "the jaws of death." Indeed, it was. Thousands would take their last breath that day and never again give or receive the warm embrace of loved ones or enjoy the comforts of home.

And for the survivors? They would spend the rest of their lives dealing with the reality of survival. They witnessed the high cost of freedom as their fellow soldiers—thousands—lay fallen as they pressed forward, enduring a storm of enemy fire, mortars and mines, they advanced and finally established a beachhead. One might think that, with such a horrible task accomplished, these men would have earned a lifetime of rest. But the war raged on, and those who survived the coming months would endure still further terrors and see the thing through.² And they did. They saw the thing through. And they would look to their homeland and wonder.

As you read this, the nation will again be celebrating its anniversary. We, the citizens of this land, will hopefully recall our great blessings. We have the blessing of the inheritance those men on a beach in France, and on fronts throughout the world, earned for us. We didn't earn it—they did! As so many decades have passed since those men reclaimed French soil, the remaining survivors are few. Soon, living memory will die. But I do wonder what they think about our use of the freedom they defended for us. Had the defense been unsuccessful, I shudder to think what life in the

world might be. As these men reached further into eastern Germany and the Baltic nations, they were given a glimpse of what they were fighting against and why they had to be victorious. And, by God's grace, they were.

Yet, I wonder what those few who remain think. As they recall the terrible cost of victory and brothers in arms that remain buried on the French coast, I wonder what they think about our use of their sacrifice. Is there anger? Is there regret? Do they look at what we've done to the world they handed down to us and shake their heads in disgust? Maybe, as we think about these things, we can begin to understand God's wrath.

The LORD saw that the wickedness of man was great in the earth, and that every intention of the thoughts of his heart was only evil continually. And the LORD regretted that he had made man on the earth, and it grieved him to his heart. So the LORD said, "I will blot out man whom I have created from the face of the land, man and animals and creeping things and birds of the heavens, for I am sorry that I have made them." But Noah found favor in the eyes of the LORD (Genesis 6:5-8).

More than once the Word of God records God's anger and regret. Anger and regret for us and what we do. What's interesting is that God is merciful. His mercy teaches us that He loves—He is love. And it's not just that He is love, but that His love is steadfast. He is abounding in His steadfast love. Anger and wrath are alien to Him—as they typically are for us (or should be). So, what causes an action that is alien to God to occur in God?

Remember, the love of God is not what we typically think love is. We think love is what makes us happy—what satisfies our desires. His love is defined by sacrifice. Indeed, He, in a sense, gives something of Himself in the very act of creating. He breathes life into us. He speaks from Himself, and it is. He gives His Word to create. His Word is a creative force that brings everything into existence. And He gives of Himself to allow us to flourish and stand beside Him reveling in the immense beauty and goodness of His creation (and it should be obvious to us that beauty and goodness are two sides of the same coin). And, of course, He gives His Son. And the Son gives His life in the ultimate act of recreation and restoration. The Word made flesh. The Word who walked among us, lived and died for us. The Word who destroyed death for us. He is and is the cause of the new creation, and in Him we are part of that same new creation. To what end?

Before I continue, I remind you that Christ, in His crucifixion, put to death all your sin. Your sin died with Him. This is the reality every baptized child of God lives in.

What shall we say then? Are we to continue in sin that grace may abound? By no means! How can we who died to sin still live in it? Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were buried therefore with him by baptism into death, in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life (Romans 6:1-4).

You are joined in and benefit from what the Lord did, what He provided and still provides through His church. We are weak, scared, full of doubts and questions, and Christ died for all of this. We are forgiven. Yet, what are we to do with all these gifts bestowed by our gracious God? Or, to restate the question I posed above: to what end have been made part of the New Creation in Christ?

Perhaps, for the sake of this writing, we are better served by ruminating on this question in the past tense. What have we done with such gifts? We are given everything. We have been freed—no sin need frighten or alarm us. We know what awaits us. We are heirs to the Kingdom of Heaven. It's all ours—not of our own doing but by the work of God. So, what have we done?

I ask you to take a moment to search your heart—a heart known all too well by your Creator. Have you fallen into the trap set by our fallen culture? Have you passively succumbed to the temptation to be only a Christian for an hour and a half on Sunday mornings in order to be acceptable to the world around you? Have you chosen to remain silent when you know you should speak? Have you removed yourself—and the Christ you carry within you—from the public square? The world, which remains the realm of the defeated yet dangerous evil one, hates you. The world hated the Lord, and He tells you that it will hate you too, dear Christian. You are dangerous to it, for you carry the Truth—the reality which the world tries desperately not to grasp. You know, as a Christian, that God's Holy Law comes, as all of God's gifts do, with blessings—great blessings. Yet, too often we hide, or worse are ashamed of, those blessings. For the sake of acceptance, we sell out. We keep from our neighbors what is needed most. We take what God gives, and we hide and twist and pervert His gifts—good things—in exchange for temporal comfort.

Think about the times—many they are—that you have worked to give those you love the very best (and you might think of your pastor who toils to give you the good gifts of God), only to see those gifts wasted. How do you react? How does God react? In the answer we can see the Lord's wrath. He desires the best for us. He gives His best for us. He sacrifices for us. And our response? If you examine your heart, you know. His wrath results from our misuse, abuse, and wasting of His love. Of course He would be angry. He holds the best before us and we choose—so very often—the worst.

It is time, during this season of Pentecost, that we examine ourselves—deeply. It is time to repent. It is time to realize we are Christians. We ARE Christians. Every hour—every minute—of each day, we are His. The world needs us to be just that. And the Lord will be with us every step of the way. That is His promise.

Faithfulness: The Stewardship Standard

"Moreover, it is required of stewards that they be found faithful" (1 Cor. 4:2).

What is the standard to which a steward is held? Ask the average person, and they might talk about percentages, tithes, and commitments. Too often, the default mode of measuring stewards is by how much and how frequently they give. This is not helpful. Measuring activity without any connection to baptismal identity is a recipe for disaster. It can either breed a sense of superiority and self-righteousness or create a culture of scarcity and despair. Neither outcome is godly or helpful.

This is not to say that stewardship should be regarded as "no big deal." St. Paul, within his discussion of the ministry to which he has been called, sets the standard of accountability for the steward: faithfulness. This removes any sense of superiority or self-righteousness and dispels scarcity and despair. When a steward manages what the Lord has entrusted to them — resources and all aspects of life — for God's purposes, the focus is not on how much or how frequently they give.

This standard reflects the stewardship portrayed in the Gospels where Jesus entrusts varying amounts, each according to ability. The commended stewards were recognized for their faithfulness in their vocation, not the amounts they managed. Conversely, the condemned stewards were not castigated for their lack of performance but for their lack of faithfulness.

What does this mean for the steward in the pew? The Lord has entrusted you with various things. Luther captures them in his explanation of the First Article of the Apostles' Creed and the Fourth Petition of the Lord's Prayer. The familiar couplets of food and drink, house and home, spouse and children, land, animals and all possessions are the Lord's, and He has entrusted them to you for His purpose. This trust brings an active realization of thanksgiving.

This active thanksgiving is our stewardship. It can be distilled into two questions that the steward regularly needs to answer:

- 1. How has God blessed me?
- 2. How is He calling me to respond?

The first question is quite simple to answer: if the Lord has entrusted something to you, it is a blessing. This blessing is for God's glory and the benefit of your neighbor. The second question is more challenging to measure; it is not about percentages and charts. Instead, it is about a life of thanksgiving that flows from the mercies of God revealed in Jesus Christ. This thanksgiving starts at and flows from the cross and the empty tomb. Our stewardship of the Gospel drives our stewardship of everything else.

The standard, then, is faithfulness. Faithfulness flows from eyes focused on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith. It does not come from our efforts but through the working of the Holy Spirit in our lives, through Word and Sacrament. It begins at the altar in the Divine Service but extends into the world — from hearth and home to workplace and classroom, from commerce to leisure. The mercy of God, freely given in Jesus, leads us to demonstrate a faithfulness that reveals to others the same mercy we have received in Jesus.

This faithfulness cannot be measured empirically. It is simply allowing the Holy Spirit to work in and through us for the glory of God and the benefit of our neighbor. Weekly. Daily. Faithfully.

DOLLARS FOR MISSIONS – Central Illinois District

Dollars for Mission had a very good month of May! By June 1, the gathering of funds for three distinct projects could be declared complete:

- \$25,000 for Masonry/tuckpointing at University Lutheran Church, Champaign
- \$2,600 for Parking lot closure devices and camera installation, Immanuel Lutheran Student Center, Macomb
- \$6,000 to Refurbish seating in library and game room and technology in game room, Immanuel Lutheran Student Center, Macomb

May was a good month indeed. In fact, by the end of it there was still some money left over for President Michael Mohr to designate a new project from the District mission sites "repairs and upgrades list," which by the way is the last thing to be found in the Mission Commission report

The new (and current!) project is **\$10,000 to replace insulation in the chancel ceiling at Wittenberg** Lutheran Center, Normal.

Dating from 1980, the fiberglass batt insulation above Wittenberg's chancel has fallen from its intended place, that is, immediately under the roof. The area needing replacement measures some 775 square feet.

This job will not be easy. The replacement area is not readily accessible, due to a non-structural ceiling right above the altar and organ in the chancel. The task of replacing this insulation will require ingenuity and creativity. In short, the total price will end up being much greater than relatively minor costs for materials.

Frankly, May was such a good month that the District office is scrambling to keep up with things. A new DFM current project page on the ceiling project for Normal is in process for CID website. Look for it soon.

The Liberty in Christ.

Here in the United States, July 4th is a big national holiday, The United States Independence Day and I am sure you celebrate it. Many families gather together for cookouts. The beaches are full of visitors. Towns all across America have parades and fireworks. It is a time for family reunions and patriotic activities. Right?



Mexico has an Independence day also. The citizens of Mexico all over the world relive the night of September 15th, 1810 when the parish priest, Miguel Hidalgo, called on his townspeople to take arms against the Spaniards who had been ruling Mexico since the days of the Conquest in 1521.

El Grito (The Shout), every 16th of September is the Mexican Fiesta par excellence! Streets, houses, buildings and cars are decorated everywhere in the country. On every street corner there are vendors selling flags, balloons, and hats, all with green, white and red, the national colors. Flags wave from practically every house and building.

It is customary for the current President to deliver the Grito at the National Palace in Mexico City. The original bell rung by Hidalgo is the bell that is rung every 16th of September. The ceremony reaches the high point when the crowd joins in proudly shouting out the names of the heroes of Independence and ends with the exciting: Viva Mexico! When the Grito ceremony ends, the sky lights up with multicolored fireworks that shower the hearts with the pride of knowing that Mexico is free and independent nation. Why I am talking about liberty? Just read Galatians 5:1 *"It is for freedom that Christ has set us free. Stand firm, then, and do not let yourselves be burdened again by a yoke of slavery"*

We have the true liberty in Christ for these reasons:

Because of His love, He died on the cross for us; Through His Gospel, we are now His Children; He gave us reconciliation and His peace; Even though we are sinners, we received His forgiveness; Because gave us faith, we confess that we receive salvation.
